Larry A. Lunsford, a member of the Rotary Club of Kansas City-Plaza, Missouri, USA, is the selection of the nominating committee to become Rotary International's president for 2027-28. He will officially become the president-nominee on 15 September if no other candidates challenge him.

Lunsford attended Truman State University in Kirksville, Missouri, on an academic scholarship, earning bachelor's and master's degrees in accounting. He first encountered Rotary when he received a Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarship to spend the 1981-82 academic year at the University of Newcastle in Australia.


A certified public accountant, Lunsford spent seven years working for Ernst & Young before joining a family-owned business, Bernstein-Rein Advertising, in 1990. He is currently executive vice president and chief financial officer for the Bernstein group of companies. He has held positions on the boards of the Kansas City Spirit Festival and the Variety Club as well as serving as director of a local bank and treasurer of the Epilepsy Foundation for the Heart of America. He has also served on Truman State University's alumni and foundation boards and received the university's Distinguished Service Award.

Lunsford joined the Rotary Club of Kansas City-Plaza in 1991 and has since served as district governor (2001-02), RI director (2013-15), and trustee of The Rotary Foundation (2021-25, vice chair 2024-25). He has been a member of RI committees, including the Executive Committee (chair 2014-15), Membership Growth Committee (chair 2016-18), and Nominating Committee for President of RI (chair 2023-24). He also has served on The Rotary Foundation's Executive Committee (chair 2023-24), Finance Committee (chair 2022-23 and 2024-25), and Participant Experience Committee (chair 2023-24).

Lunsford has been awarded The Rotary Foundation Distinguished Service Award, The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service, and the RI Service Above Self Award. He and his wife, Jill Lunsford, have two children and one grandchild. They are Major Donors, Bequest Society members, multiple Paul Harris Fellows, Benefactors of The Rotary Foundation, and Sustaining Members.

OLAYINKA HAKEEM BABALOLA SELECTED TO BE 2026-27 ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT

Olayinka Hakeem Babalola, a member of the Rotary Club of Trans Amadi, Nigeria, has been selected by the Board of Directors to become Rotary International's president for 2026-27. His term will begin on 1 July 2026.

The Board, guided by the RI code of policies, conducted a special session to select the organization's leader after the <u>resignation of RI President-elect SangKoo Yun</u>, who decided to step back from his Rotary responsibilities and focus on his recovery from recent cancer treatment.

Babalola began his Rotary journey in 1984 as a Rotaractor. He joined the Rotary Club of Trans Amadi 10 years later. His leadership roles include serving as district governor (2011-12), RI vice president (2019-20), and member of the RI Board (2018-20). He was also an active leader and participant in RI committees such as the End Polio Now Countdown to History Campaign Committee (2017-23) and the Nigeria National PolioPlus Committee (2013-present, adviser 2016-present).

Babalola received a university degree in engineering in 1988. He worked for 25 years in the oil and gas industry, holding senior positions in Shell PLC. He is the founder of two companies: Riviera Technical Services Ltd., an oil and gas infrastructure delivery company, and Lead and Change Consulting, an executive coaching and organizational performance advisory group.

Babalola's professional affiliations include the Nigerian Society of Engineers, the Institute of Safety Professionals of Nigeria, and the Association of Change Management Professionals. He is a member of Jericho Businessmen Club, an organization in his birth city of Ibadan that provides input to governments on economic and social policy.




OLAYINKA HAKEEM BABALOLA SELECTED TO BE 2026-27 ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT



GUIDELINES FOR FILMING A VIDEO FOR COMPETITION "THE POWER OF GOODNESS"

1. Plan the filming in advance.

As you prepare your project or event, decide who will be responsible for filming, what equipment will be used, and which shots will be needed. Assign a dedicated person or team for this task.

2. Use a drone when possible.

For outdoor activities, aerial shots provide dynamics and add a professional look to the video.

3. Include interviews.

Record short interviews with participants, volunteers, organizers, or beneficiaries. Ask what the project means to them, how it made them feel, or what inspired them.

4. Tell a story, not just document.

Focus on emotions, action, and outcomes. Show people, not only activities.

5. Capture the preparation phase.

Behind-the-scenes footage of volunteers packing, organizing, or coordinating creates authenticity and highlights the effort behind the cause.

6. Gather short statements.

Even one or two sincere sentences from someone whose life has been touched can be very powerful. Seek authenticity rather than long monologues.

7. Ensure good lighting.

Whether indoors or outdoors, light is essential. Avoid dark rooms or shooting directly against the sun.

8. Use stable equipment.

Unsteady shots are distracting. If you don't have a professional camera, use a tripod or stabilizer for your phone.

9. Film in horizontal format.

For higher quality and compatibility with platforms such as YouTube, always shoot horizontally.

10. Include close-up shots.

Faces, smiles, and hands in action bring warmth and humanity to the story.

11. Ensure clear sound.

Use an external microphone if possible. In noisy environments, consider recording separately or adding narration afterwards.

12. Show the final result.

Present the completed project, the happy participants, and the overall impact achieved.

13. Build a timeline through your shots.

Show "before, during, and after" the event. This structure helps tell a complete story.

14. Capture audience reactions.

Smiles, applause, and emotions are living proof of the project's impact.

15. Include children and youth (with consent).

If children are part of the initiative, ensure parental consent for filming. Their smiles often speak louder than words.

16. Add supporting images or archives.

If your project has history, use "before and after" comparisons, documents, or older photos to show progress.

17. Use music to enhance emotion.

Neutral, uplifting music reinforces the message. Make sure to use licensed tracks or free-to-use libraries.

18. Add English subtitles, especially when people are speaking.

Even short statements should be subtitled to ensure clarity and accessibility.

19. Display names and roles.

When showing someone speaking, add their name and role for context.

20. Start and finish with identity elements.

Open with a short title/intro and close with your club's logo.

21. Include a message or a quote.

A powerful line or inspiring quote at the end can leave a lasting emotional impression.

22. Prepare a clear script before editing.

Decide what story you want to tell, in what sequence, and with which footage.

23. Show the impact achieved.

Highlight how lives were improved or what was accomplished. This is the heart of the contest — the lasting mark of kindness.

24. Respect Rotary branding.

Use the official Rotary logo, fonts, and colors. Guidelines are available at brandcenter.rotary.org.

For years, in personal trainings, both as a participant and as an educator, we have talked about the art of explaining the issue or being able to explain itself in 30 seconds. I never imagined that this brief and concise introduction issue, which we call "elevator pitch" in elevator speech or in English, would carry me to the Reggio Calabria on the opposite shore of Sicily at the end of drawing to the south of Italy.

At the Peace Conference held in Istanbul in February, while trying to go down to the halls by elevator, Rtn, who tried to catch up with the elevator with a smiling face. The whole adventure started when I got Giampaolo Latella on board. Our 30-second elevator journey, which starts with which club is 38. While extending from parallel clubs to twin clubs, from there to preparations for the Mediterranean Peace Conference, from Positive Peace Activism to projects for women's empowerment, we have also sowed the first seeds of a great friendship.

The Mediterranean Peace Days Conference organized by the Reggio Calabria Rotary Club was held between 6-8 June. In the 3-day event, we talked about Peace in the Mediterranean with the Rotary Leaders from Albania, Greece, Kosovo, Morocco, Serbia, Spain, Tunisia, Turkey and Ukraine. We witnessed the touching call of our Rotary friend who joined the Palestinian Bethlehem RK via Zoom.

More than twenty speakers moderated by Giancarla Rondinelli, an important journalist in the country, we took turns in different panels dedicated to economic development in the Mediterranean on the issues of peacebuilding, equal opportunities in health and education, environment and sustainable energy. I was blessed with the opening speech of this great colorful event, of which I was the guest of honor. I talked about the roles of women throughout history, the importance of women in making social peace permanent, and the world examples that strong women should not be underestimated in social reconciliation.







As the only Turk and a woman representing our flag in this great international organization, I sang our National Anthem to this geography. I was thanked for bringing the Sylvia Whitlock award to Europe. I realized once again that friendships are independent of the language you speak rather than flags!

38TH INTERNATIONAL ÇANAKKALE STRAIT SWIMMING RACE

On August 30,the 38th International Çanakkale Strait Swimming Race brought together 1,434 athletes — including 254 international swimmers — in the historic waters of the Dardanelles. Organized by the Çanakkale Rotary Club under Rotary District 2440, the event once again united continents, cultures, and hearts through sport.

Starting from the European shore at Eceabat and finishing on the Asian side at Çanakkale Pier, swimmers covered the 6,482-meter course with strokes symbolizing friendship, peace, and solidarity. Inspired by the timeless legend of Hero and Leandros, the race conveyed a strong message of unity to the world.

Club President Sevil Ural highlighted the spirit of the day: "Every stroke was dedicated with gratitude to Gazi Mustafa Kemal Atatürk and all the heroes of our Independence Struggle. This event is not only a race, but also a celebration of Victory Day that promotes peace and fellowship."

District 2440 Governor Adnan Sözeri emphasized Rotary's role in bringing people together: "Today, we connected not only Europe and Asia, but also peace, friendship, and human values. As Rotarians, we take pride in building bridges of fellowship both in service and in sport."

With the support of public institutions, sponsors, and 380 volunteers, the race was carried out with the highest safety standards. The women's overall title went to 16-year-old Çiğdem Ezo Topaloğlu with a time of 56:03, while Steven Claes from Belgium won the men's category in 51:03.

The Çanakkale Strait once again proved to be more than just a body of water — it became a symbol of history, unity, and Rotary's enduring spirit of service.



Offer a Hand, Not Aggression

Knives in backpacks. Fights in the bathrooms. Words that cut deeper than fists.

Too often now, the headlines tell of children hurting other children. Of classrooms filled with silence that screams. Of teachers unsure where to begin. Of parents who learn of the violence only when it's too late.

School aggression is no longer an isolated "incident." It is a symptom of a system in distress—a society that has grown numb to the fear in a child's eyes.

The project "Extend a Hand, Not Aggression" was born from this pain—but also from a place of hope.

Hope that we can restore trust. That we can build a new language—one of empathy instead of insults. That we can create safe spaces where every child feels protected, heard, and accepted.

What have we achieved so far?

Together with a team of psychologists and educators, we developed a therapeutic board game designed to support children who have experienced or witnessed violence and bullying in schools. The game was piloted in a protected and controlled environment, with the involvement of professionals and strict adherence to confidentiality and ethical standards.

This gave us valuable insights—and the confidence that we are approaching the issue with the necessary care, sensitivity, and professionalism.

What's next?

Our next step is to move beyond the protected setting and bring this tool into real school environments—guided by trained facilitators, dedicated teams, and a clear support framework.

Why is this project different?

Because it doesn't look for someone to blame. It looks for understanding. For solutions.

It works not only with the children who have been hurt, but also with those who have shown aggression, with the bystanders, and with the ones who want to help but don't know how.

"Extend a Hand, Not Aggression" is not just a project—it's a stance. A call to action. An outstretched hand—not only to children, but to every adult willing to reflect, to change, and to be part of the solution.

What lies ahead?

We're not stopping here. We believe in the impact we've already made—but we know more is needed.

We dream of expanding the project: reaching new schools and communities, training new teams, and providing access to tools and knowledge where there have been none.

If you believe that every child deserves a safe and secure childhood...

If you believe that empathy can be taught, and that kindness is not a weakness but a strength— Join our network.

Because change starts with one conversation.

With one hand, extended.

NATIONAL COMMEMORATION – 148 Years of the Battle of Shipka Hikes of Friendship and Gratitude – With Rotary in the Footsteps of the Heroes



In the Footsteps of the Heroes – A Short Travelogue from the Culminating Day of 148 Years of the Shipka Epic

The day began with the ringing of bells and a solemn requiem in the Sokolski Monastery. Among the fresh coolness of the monastery courtyards, the prayer, led by Father Ruslan, gathered Rotarians, friends, and dozens of pilgrims, who set off to walk their path in the footsteps of the volunteers. "We must be united – as 148 years ago, so today," said the priest, and these words seemed to give the tone of the whole day. Shortly after the service, the voices of the hikers filled the paths. Three were the routes, symbolically named "Marches of Friendship and Gratitude – with Rotary in the Footsteps of the Heroes."

The first, from the Sokolski Monastery to the peak, gathered over 80 people – among them Rotarians from Gabrovo and Sevlievo, dozens of friends, but above all the children from the "Young Mountaineer" tourist society – Petrich, who for eight years now have been coming at the invitation of Rotary Club Gabrovo together with their leader Gergana Sandakchieva.

The second march – from Uzana to the peak – gathered over 30 participants, among them the chairman of the Gabrovo Municipal Council, Kliment Kunev, with his family, friends, and the deputy chairman of the Municipal Council, Nikolay Grigorov, who led the group with patriotic charge.

The third march, from the Memorial Temple "Nativity of Christ" in the town of Shipka, gathered Rotarians, Rotaractors, and friends from the clubs in Stara Zagora, Nova Zagora, Sliven, and Kazanlak. More than 20 people climbed the steep steps to the Monument of Freedom, carrying in their hearts the living memory of the deed.

When the hours approached noon, the peak was already filled with patriots from all over the country. The solemn part began with the acceptance of the honor guard of the 61st Stryamska Brigade by the Chairperson of the National Assembly. The high clergy held a requiem in memory of the fallen, and exactly at 12:00 the ceremony of laying wreaths and flowers began. Among them, a special place was taken by the wreaths laid on behalf of Rotary District 2482, Rotary Club Gabrovo, and Rotary Club Sevlievo – a sign that the gratitude of the Rotarians is alive and profound.

Into the strictness of the military ritual flowed the warmth of a symbolic message – a puzzle of twenty rectangles, assembled by the Rotarians, whose two sides bore the inscriptions: "148 Years Shipka Epic" and "United for Good." This puzzle, breaking protocol for a moment, brought a smile and reminded that the power of unity is the greatest weapon – both then and now. With applause from those present, the patriotic chants of the young mountaineers were honored.

After the ceremony, the reenactment of the battles, presented by the National Society "Tradition," came to life. In the smoke of cannons and the gunfire, under the cry "Hurrah!" the spectators seemed to be transported back in time. Vazov's "The Volunteers at Shipka" came alive before our eyes – not as verse, but as a living picture of heroism.

The photo-documentary exhibition "The Long Road of Our National Anthem," prepared by the Shipka-Buzludzha National Park-Museum, added yet another layer of memory to the day. The panels with documents, photographs, and musical scores told the story of "Mila Rodino" and its predecessors. Symbolically, the exhibition will continue its path – from the peak to Gabrovo – to remind that our anthem, too, is a child of struggle, memory, and unity.





The whole day carried within it the warmth of the late-August sun – gentle, yet filled with pathos and gratitude. The children played and smiled, the veterans of the tourist societies shared memories, and the Rotarians combined tradition with the message of the present.

The theme of the Rotary year – "United for Good," announced by the Governor of Rotary Bulgaria, Plamen Tsvetkov from Rotary Club Ruse-Danube, seemed to come alive in full strength on this day. It became not a slogan, but a lived reality – in the steps along the trails, in the prayers on the peak, in the children who learn heroism not from books, but from the living touch of the place where history was written in blood and honor.

Thus ended the day of the 148th anniversary of the Shipka Epic – not as a museum event, but as a living travelogue of feelings, footsteps, and unity. For just as once our heroes defended freedom at the cost of their lives, so today we are obliged to guard their memory – united, strong, and grateful.





5th Balkan Architectural Workshop in Kardzhali – Inspiration for the Future

From 22 to 28 September 2025, Rotary Club Kardzhali will host the Fifth Balkan Student Architectural Workshop, in partnership with Momchilgrad Municipality and Rotary Club Momchilgrad.

The project, launched as an initiative of the ICC Committees of Turkey and North Macedonia, has already been established as a platform for exchanging ideas and fostering friendship among young architects from the Balkans. This year, the workshop will bring together 12 architecture students from Bulgaria, Turkey – Rotary Club Istanbul Şişli, North Macedonia – Rotary Club Skopje Kamen Most, and for the first time, Greece – Rotary Club Amaroussion. Each country will also be represented by a mentor who will play a leading role in the work of the teams.

The students will be divided into three or four international teams, each developing its own concept on the assigned theme – the creation of a **Cultural Center at the Thracian Sanctuary in the village of Tatul.** Participants will enjoy complete freedom in their approach, with results presented in the form of drawings, 3D visualizations, or animations.

At the end of the workshop, the projects will be compiled on up to four A1 panels per team and presented at a special final exhibition, open to institutions, professionals, and the general public. All project proposals will be officially handed over to Momchilgrad Municipality as a potential foundation for future real-world implementation.

The Union of Bulgarian Architects plays a significant role in supporting the preparation of the event, while mentoring is entrusted to four architects, including the Chief Architect of Momchilgrad Municipality, who authored the design brief for the students.

The final evening will be marked by a formal fellowship dinner, bringing together students, their mentors, representatives of the Union of Bulgarian Architects, and Rotarians.

The Balkan Student Architectural Workshop is far more than an academic initiative – it is a meeting of cultures, ideas, and dreams. Through it, Rotary once again proves that friendship, dialogue, and cooperation are the strongest foundations upon which our

common future can be built.


