If Aliens Asked About Rotary and Polio

Sometimes the best way to understand the significance of what we do is to step outside our daily reality. Imagine, for a moment, that we could sit down with an extraterrestrial civilization and they asked us a simple questions: What is Rotary doing about polio? Why? What has been achieved? What drives you? How would we answer?

Our answer would be both proud and humble. We would begin by saying that Rotary, a global organization founded in 1905, is committed to serving humanity through peace, health, education, and sustainable development. But above all, in this moment of history, Rotary has one defining mission: to eradicate polio from the face of the Earth.

Why?

Because polio, once a devastating disease in more than 120 countries, now lingers in only two Pakistan and Afghanistan. Decades of relentless effort have reduced global cases by over 99.9%. The infrastructure created labs, surveillance, vaccination networks, and hundreds of thousands of health workers, forms one of humanity's most remarkable collective achievements.

For over three decades, Rotary has been at the forefront of one of humanity's greatest public health efforts. Once present in so many countries, paralyzing hundreds of thousands of children each year, the disease is now confined to just two nations. This transformation is the result of relentless vaccination campaigns, the dedication of 400,000+ frontline workers, and the steadfast partnerships Rotary has built with WHO, UNICEF, the Gates Foundation, and countless governments.

What has been achieved?

Thanks to Rotary and its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative millions of children walk today. Countries that once faced regular outbreaks now enjoy decades of freedom from polio. And yet, vigilance is essential. Cases still appear. Vaccine hesitancy spreads. Conflict zones challenge access. Which is why Rotary's commitment must remain visible not only in October, the Month of Polio, but throughout the year. This is why we launched Polio Talks, a platform for continuous global dialogue and awareness, ensuring that this cause does not fade from memory in polio-free regions. While polio is anywhere it remains a threat everywhere.

If Aliens Asked About Rotary and Polio

What motivates us?

Beyond the numbers lies motivation. It is not only about a disease. It is about Rotary's promise to the children of the world. It is about proving that humanity, when united across borders and beliefs, can defeat an enemy once thought invincible. It is about ensuring that no parent ever again must fear this crippling illness.

A deep belief in Service Above Self. Whether through donations, awareness campaigns, volunteering, or simply carrying the "End Polio Now" logo into the world, Rotarians embody a shared responsibility for the future.

Each Rotarian is driven by the same simple promise: that no child, anywhere, should ever again suffer from polio. The fight is not only about eradicating a virus; it is about justice, equality, and the shared belief that together we can make the world safer and healthier.

If we had to sum it up for our extraterrestrial visitors, we would say: Rotary's work against polio is humanity's declaration of hope. It is not a question of if we will end polio, but when. And when that day comes, it will stand as one of the greatest legacies we leave to future generations on this planet and, perhaps, as an example to others beyond it.

Call to Action

As we celebrate Rotary's 120 years of service, let us renew our personal and collective promise. Contribute to the PolioPlus Fund. Share the message in your communities. Use your voice, your time, and your resources. Because polio anywhere is a threat everywhere and together, we can write the final chapter of this story.

GUIDELINES FOR FILMING A VIDEO FOR COMPETITION "THE POWER OF GOODNESS"

1. Plan the filming in advance.

As you prepare your project or event, decide who will be responsible for filming, what equipment will be used, and which shots will be needed. Assign a dedicated person or team for this task.

2. Use a drone when possible.

For outdoor activities, aerial shots provide dynamics and add a professional look to the video.

3. Include interviews.

Record short interviews with participants, volunteers, organizers, or beneficiaries. Ask what the project means to them, how it made them feel, or what inspired them.

4. Tell a story, not just document.

Focus on emotions, action, and outcomes. Show people, not only activities.

5. Capture the preparation phase.

Behind-the-scenes footage of volunteers packing, organizing, or coordinating creates authenticity and highlights the effort behind the cause.

6. Gather short statements.

Even one or two sincere sentences from someone whose life has been touched can be very powerful. Seek authenticity rather than long monologues.

7. Ensure good lighting.

Whether indoors or outdoors, light is essential. Avoid dark rooms or shooting directly against the sun.

8. Use stable equipment.

Unsteady shots are distracting. If you don't have a professional camera, use a tripod or stabilizer for your phone.

9. Film in horizontal format.

For higher quality and compatibility with platforms such as YouTube, always shoot horizontally.

10. Include close-up shots.

Faces, smiles, and hands in action bring warmth and humanity to the story.

11. Ensure clear sound.

Use an external microphone if possible. In noisy environments, consider recording separately or adding narration afterwards.

12. Show the final result.

Present the completed project, the happy participants, and the overall impact achieved.

13. Build a timeline through your shots.

Show "before, during, and after" the event. This structure helps tell a complete story.

14. Capture audience reactions.

Smiles, applause, and emotions are living proof of the project's impact.

15. Include children and youth (with consent).

If children are part of the initiative, ensure parental consent for filming. Their smiles often speak louder than words.

16. Add supporting images or archives.

If your project has history, use "before and after" comparisons, documents, or older photos to show progress.

17. Use music to enhance emotion.

Neutral, uplifting music reinforces the message. Make sure to use licensed tracks or free-to-use libraries.

18. Add English subtitles, especially when people are speaking.

Even short statements should be subtitled to ensure clarity and accessibility.

19. Display names and roles.

When showing someone speaking, add their name and role for context.

20. Start and finish with identity elements.

Open with a short title/intro and close with your club's logo.

21. Include a message or a quote.

A powerful line or inspiring quote at the end can leave a lasting emotional impression.

22. Prepare a clear script before editing.

Decide what story you want to tell, in what sequence, and with which footage.

23. Show the impact achieved.

Highlight how lives were improved or what was accomplished. This is the heart of the contest — the lasting mark of kindness.

24. Respect Rotary branding.

Use the official Rotary logo, fonts, and colors. Guidelines are available at brandcenter.rotary.org.

Rotary Intercountry Committees Meeting in Brussels – 25 September 2025

The Rotary Intercountry Committees (ICCs) gathered in Brussels on 25 September 2025 for a high-level meeting featuring leaders from across Rotary International, showcasing ICCs' growing role as bridges of peace and cross-cultural cooperation.

Opening by PDG Nathalie Huyghebaert, ICC Executive Council Chair

Nathalie welcomed participants, stressing that ICCs thrive through "friendship across borders," modern communications, and the energy of global members. She noted the increasing involvement of Rotaractors and highlighted ICCs' rapid responses to crises—from earthquakes in Turkey and Morocco to wildfires in Spain and the humanitarian emergency in Ukraine. Current actions include a collaborative initiative to provide food for 1,000 children in Gaza, supported by the Rotary Action Group for Peace and international partners. She also outlined upcoming ICC events in Athens, the UAE, UNESCO, and the 2026 Rotary International Convention in Taiwan, as well as the ICC Assembly in Lecco, Italy, in May 2026, where elections and the new ICC Peace Award will take place.

Remarks by Rotary International President Francesco Arezzo

President Arezzo affirmed ICCs as vital to his priorities of eradicating polio, growing membership, and fostering peace. He emphasized the role of personal interaction in overcoming fear and building peace, drawing on his experience hosting an international RYLA in Sicily.

Rotary Programs and Peacebuilding: Director Ellina Kushnir

Ellina Kushnir highlighted Rotary's seven structured programs, from Interact and Youth Exchange to Fellowships and Action Groups, linking them to leadership, intercultural understanding, and community impact. She urged ICCs to set measurable goals and ensure that activities deliver concrete results—stronger relationships, better understanding, and healthier communities.

European Perspective: Andreas Strub

Andreas reflected on peace as the universal desire of ordinary people for safety, dignity, and opportunity. Drawing on Europe's post-war reconciliation, he emphasized Rotary's power to rebuild trust through intercultural initiatives. He urged ICCs to engage youth and link peacebuilding to themes such as the environment and climate change, reminding participants: "Argue as much as you want, but don't let the day end without making peace."





"Evaluation of the GELS, and GNLS Meetings: Towards a Strong Future from Brussels"

The Rotary Zone Institute, branded as "Fusion", aimed to bring together 10 Rotary Zones and approximately 150 Districts from across Europe, the Middle East, and Africa. The summit gathered 1600 participants, making it one of the most comprehensive regional gatherings in Rotary's recent history. The program spanned several segments: September 23–25 for GELS (Governor-Elect Learning Seminar) / GNLS (Governor-Nominee Learning Seminar) / PLS (Partners Learning Seminar) seminars, followed by September 25–28 for the plenary and thematic sessions. The Fusion 2025 Summit, held in Brussels under the Rotary EMEA (Europe–Middle East–Africa) framework, emerged as an inspiring milestone strengthening Rotary's collective vision and leadership unity. Within this framework, the GELS and GNLS sessions further enhanced the program by offering participants valuable content that cultivated practical skills and created dynamic platforms for vision sharing.

GELS and GNLS sessions created a dynamic platform for incoming governors to share their experiences, build networks, and develop actionable strategies. These seminars fostered cross-cultural dialogue and practical leadership insights. Participants gained tools to navigate local challenges while contributing to the broader Rotary vision. Through their interactive and participatory approach, the meetings fostered a dynamic discussion platform where diverse ideas could be openly debated, and multiple perspectives shared. This created an exceptionally productive and valuable environment, enabling participants to learn from one another while thoughtfully evaluating both commonalities and differences.

While the initial sessions of the Zone Institute—GELS, GNLS, and PLS—offered valuable learning opportunities, there were limited chances for the approximately 150 participating district Rotarians to fully connect and interact. Optimizing the spatial layout and enhancing the linkage between seminar rooms and common areas, as well as allowing more informal networking time within the program, could further strengthen the sense of unity and collaboration among Rotarians from different zones.

The Governor-Elect and Governor-Nominee Learning Seminars were thoughtfully designed to equip future Rotary leaders with practical expertise in strategic planning, communication, vision development, and team management. The seamless collaboration among facilitators embodied the true spirit of 'Fusion,' uniting diverse knowledge through shared learning and mutual respect. Moreover, the seminars empowered participants with confidence, strategic insight, and networks essential for effective leadership in their upcoming terms. One of the most valued aspects of these sessions was the open, inclusive environment that fostered cross-cultural dialogue, enabling leaders from varied linguistic and cultural backgrounds to cultivate a shared understanding of leadership within the Rotary context.

Italian ICC Model: PDG Alessandro Pastorini

Alessandro presented the revitalization of ICCs in Italy, San Marino, and Malta, now numbering 57. Through strong coordination and digital transformation, the network has expanded and hosted major conferences on migration and Mediterranean peace. The upcoming ICC Assembly in Lecco will focus on "ICC and World Peace."

Panel: ICCs as Bridges of Peace

Moderated by PDG Ashot Karapetyan, the panel featured PRID Katerina Kotsali-Papadimitriou, PDG Güneş Ertaş, PDG Ovidio Cos, and Yaseen Jaffer. They defined ICCs as Rotary's "people-to-people diplomacy," citing practical projects such as aid for Ukraine, youth camps, and interfaith initiatives. Key messages included Rotary's neutrality as a unique advantage, the need for measurable local impact, and youth as indispensable peacebuilders.

Rotary in Afghanistan: Rameen Javid

Rameen reported on Rotary's resilience in Afghanistan, where three active clubs continue projects in education, health, and economic development despite immense challenges. The chartering of the first ICC in Afghanistan marks a milestone in connecting the country to Rotary's global peace network.









Africa and the Future of ICCs

A panel moderated by Pierangelo Panozzo brought insights from Marie-Irène Richmond, Thomas Huyghebaert, and PRID Patrick Chisanga. They emphasized community-centered peacebuilding, the catalytic role of women and youth, and linking grassroots ICC projects to AU–EU platforms. Consensus emerged that every local project—from equipping health clinics to supporting microenterprises—represents a tangible step toward lasting peace.

India-USA Peace Path

Rahul Wadhwa introduced the "Peace Path," a Gandhian initiative retracing the Salt March with thousands of Rotarians and citizens. Activities included Peace Pole installations, peace pledges, and rallies. Future plans involve "Peace Groves" and a second Peace Path in 2026, with global participation invited.

Rotary and Rotaract Together for Peace

A youth-led panel, moderated by Maria Vittoria Gargiulo, stressed genuine integration of Rotaractors in Rotary decision-making. They highlighted projects emerging from the Rotaract Days at the United Nations, cross-cultural district initiatives, and strategies for joint Rotary-Rotaract leadership. Their message: peace accelerates when Rotary and Rotaract work as one team.

Upcoming ICC Events and Charter Ceremonies

Future events were promoted, including the ICC and Public Image Forum in Athens (13–16 November 2025) and UNESCO Day. The meeting concluded with charter ceremonies for new ICCs between Belux–Spain, Belux–Romania and Moldova, Afghanistan, and France–Mali.

The Brussels ICC Meeting affirmed Rotary's ICCs as vital engines of peace, dialogue, and humanitarian response—connecting cultures, addressing urgent needs, and empowering future generations to build trust across borders.










Rotary Fusion Summit Concludes in Brussels with 1,600 Participants

One of Rotary's largest gatherings in Europe, the Middle East, and Africa, the Rotary Fusion Summit, was held this year in Belgium's capital with 1,600 participants. Under the theme "Breaking Barriers, Building Bridges," the summit aimed to strengthen international collaboration, showcase innovative projects, and bring together diverse cultures within the Rotary community. Prior to the main summit, from September 23–25, the GELS, GNLS, and PLS programs were completed for future Rotary leaders. These sessions provided incoming district governors with leadership and governance training.

Over four days, key topics such as global health, peace, digital transformation, human rights, and international relations dominated the discussions. The "Polio Plus Talks" sessions highlighted the partnership between Rotary and the World Health Organization, while the "Rotary and International Organisations" panel focused on collaboration strategies with global institutions.

The summit featured distinguished speakers from around the world. Baroness Dr. Françoise Meunier addressed Rotary values and civil society impact, while Enabel CEO Jean Van Wetter shared insights on international development. Nicolas Crochet and Roger H. Hartmann presented examples on microfinance and sustainability, and Dr. Theopista Ntale Sekitto discussed the role of women in financial inclusion.

In health and vaccination sessions, Prof. Dr. Pierre Van Damme, Prof. Peter Piot, Dr. Tunji Funsho, Jamila Louahed, and EMA Director Emer Cooke presented the latest developments on Polio+ and immunization. Dr. Jamal Ahmed from WHO examined expertise, technology, and trust in the "Polio Plus Talks" session, while Prof. Heidi J. Larson analyzed public trust in vaccines from

Peace and international collaboration were also central themes. Dr. Andreas Strub from the European Union emphasized the importance of trust and dialogue in peacebuilding. Rotary International General Secretary John Hewko and Greenpeace CTO Priscilla Chomba-Kinywa discussed Rotary's cooperation with international organizations. Belgian Interior Minister Bernard Quintin and Tibu Africa founder Mohamed Amine Zariat shared strong messages on youth engagement and peace initiatives.

The cultural and social program added vibrancy to the summit. Under the "Fusion Off" banner, Vlad Popovici, Alexandre Helson, and Jeremy Le Van delivered presentations on business and social entrepreneurship. A gala dinner at Belgium's National Automobile Museum Autoworld on September 27 and a special concert at Flagey provided memorable experiences for attendees.

The Intercountry Committees (ICCs) played an active role throughout the summit. The ICC Summit on September 25 and the ICC dinner on September 26 helped strengthen international friendships. ICCs also showcased their projects and partnership opportunities at the "House of Friendship."

Civil society organizations had a prominent presence, particularly ShelterBox and the WASH Action Group, highlighting their disaster relief and humanitarian initiatives. Two consecutive luncheons were held for Major Donors, recognizing new contributors with pins and plaques, and offering photo opportunities with RI President Francesco Arezzo.









Rotary Fusion Summit Concludes in Brussels with 1,600 Participants

On September 27, 2025, the awards ceremony for the Power of Goodness Video Contest took place, attended by RI President-elect Yinka Babalola and Zone 21 Director Daniel Tanase. Prizes were awarded to the top three videos, and a special award was presented posthumously to Zone 21B Corporate Communications Assistant Coordinator Vesna Baur.

On September 19, 2025, Kayseri Rotary Club, Konya Meram Rotary Club, Adana Taşköprü Rotary Club and Osmaniye Rotary Club came together in Yeşilyurt Village, Düziçi, Osmaniye with the theme of "Unite for Good."

At the first stop of the day, Yeşilyurt Primary School, stationery, bags and books were provided to support the children's educational journey; the school's cleaning and stationery supplies were completed. Dental health screening and training were carried out for the children. Our Dental Health Main Committee Chair Dt. Ülkü Aktaş, and our members Dt. Yunus Emre Kocacık and Dt. Anıl Çetin examined the children and contributed to their awareness on oral and dental health. Afterwards, each child was given a toothbrush and toothpaste.

In order for children to gain awareness of safe living, traffic awareness training was organized and "Traffic Rules" books prepared by Türkiye İş Bankası were distributed. In this way, the training was made permanent.

For the parents, a Mental Health Awareness Training was conducted by Psychologist Buğra Erkmen. This interactive, Q&A-based session became much more efficient and valuable thanks to the families' interest.

Since the village has limited access to health services, a comprehensive renovation was carried out at Yeşilyurt Health Center. With painting, plastering and renewals, the health center became more hygienic and functional. In addition, Dr. Emir Kaan İzci provided basic health information and offered important support.

Finally, in order to add hope and imagination to the children's world, the Mobile Library Project was launched. After book reading activities, story and coloring books were gifted to the children, taking the first step for them to create their own libraries.

At the end of the day, hosted by Osmaniye Rotary Club, a "Summer Garden Party – End Polio" event was held at Büyük Osmaniye Hotel. This special night, full of music and entertainment, was organized to draw attention to polio and raise awareness. Appreciation was extended to Assistant Governor Bekir Turgut, responsible for Group 1 Clubs, and to Kayseri Rotary Club, Konya Meram Rotary Club, Adana Taşköprü Rotary Club, Çukurova Rotary Club, and Gaziantep Rotary Club for their support.



From October 4-5, 2025, the Bahçeşehir College Gaziantep Campus will host NASA Space Apps Challenge Gaziantep 2025, an international science hackathon where youth will develop innovative solutions to scientific problems using technology.

Why Is It Important?

What Will Happen at the Event?

50 students will receive laptops for equal access

Drone races, VR-based space exploration, and STEM workshops will be organized

Project areas include: Space technology, artificial intelligence, sustainability, climate data, and data science

What Will Be Achieved?

3 teams will be selected as Turkey National Finalists

2 teams will be nominated as NASA "Global Nominees" and submitted directly to the global finals.

Some projects will become startups, and participants will gain access to international scholarships and global tech networks.

NASA Space Apps Challenge Gaziantep 2025 is not only about science and innovation, but also about global civic collaboration. The event is being co-organized by Kafka Art Academy, Eurasia Rotary Club, and Gaziantep Rotary Club.

Rotaract Clubs will manage NASA data infrastructure, digital security, and project logistics throughout the hackathon process.

Interact Clubs will actively participate as competing teams.

Senior Rotary members will serve as mentors, supporting project development and team growth.

Rotary representatives will join the jury, combining scientific evaluation with a focus on social impact.

Being able to co-organize such a meaningful global initiative with the Rotary family reflects our shared commitment to global solidarity and innovation. From Gaziantep to the world: think together, build together!





With its expanding membership and revitalized energy, the Kayseri Rotary Club looks forward to launching more impactful projects and creating greater opportunities to serve society.









When the Global Polio Eradication Initiative began in 1988, polio was paralyzing more than 350,000 children every year across 125 countries. Thanks to the tireless work of health workers, governments, and partners like Rotary, polio is now on the verge of becoming only the second disease in human history to be eradicated. Today, wild poliovirus remains endemic in just two countries—Pakistan and Afghanistan.

In 2014, a young Rotaractor from Romania was reading about the polio eradication efforts and dreaming of working one day for this great cause, today, that young Rotaractor is a young Rotarian working in Pakistan with UNICEF, for the polio eradication initiative.

In Pakistan, the eradication journey has been long and challenging, but the progress is real and inspiring. Last year, the country recorded 74 cases while this year, that number fell to 29. And most are limited to one region, South Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, a region with unique dynamics including issues of access or security for the polio workers and population movements.

On the other side, large areas of the country that once struggled, such as Karachi, Quetta Block, and Peshawar-Khyber, have not reported a single case in 2025. Punjab, home to more than half the country's children, has remained polio-free for seven months.

But do you know how all this progress happens on ground? It's by knocking every single door in Pakistan and vaccinating over 45 million children during the national vaccination campaigns. Every year, more than 3 national campaigns are being implemented, with more than 3 subnational where around 29 million children are being vaccinated.

When written like this, it might not sound so amazing, but during my year here I joined 4 campaigns, walking along the polio workers from house to house, in extreme heat in some cases, and I must say that the efforts of these people to deliver vaccines and protect children against polio are beyond any written story.

Behind every drop of polio vaccine, behind every vaccinated child are the women and men that often walk for hours under the scorching sun, cross rivers in small boats, or climb steep mountain paths to make sure no child is left unprotected. At times, they even risk their lives in challenging security situations, yet they show up for every campaign with courage and determination.

For me even more touching are the women vaccinators whose role is remarkable, not only are they protecting children from polio, but they are also challenging deep-rooted social norms. By going door-to-door, engaging with families, and earning the trust of mothers, they are becoming agents of change, showing that women can lead, work, and shape healthier futures for their communities. Their efforts are not only bringing us closer to a polio-free world but also paving the way for greater women's empowerment in Pakistan.

And all these efforts, challenges, and progress are to protect the children that rely on us.

They don't know all of us behind this initiative, but they are joyful, they are full of hopes and dreams and whenever I am in the field, their curious eyes when they see a foreigner in their community motivates me to not give up and continue giving my best so no child will ever suffer from this preventable disease again

This important action was further proof that Rotary has the power to touch lives, support local communities, and build bridges of hope and cooperation.


















RID 2475 - RC DIONYSOS



We thank everyone from the bottom of our hearts for their cooperation!




















RID 2475- RC KERKYRA KAPODISTRIAS

Let us unite – across borders, languages and generations – and state clearly: Education is a right, not a privilege. Let us dream of a world where every child learns to read and write – and then, as People of Action, work tirelessly to make that dream real.

Together we can change lives, starting with the power of education. Together, we are united for good.

Have you ever imagined what a better future for Bulgaria could look like? A future where young people not only remain in their homeland, but truly thrive. This is one of the dreams that Rotary clubs in Bulgaria are turning into reality. We do not simply donate equipment or funds – we put our hearts into one of the most precious resources of all: Bulgarian education. With every project, we as Rotarians bring life and emotion into the learning process, we support talent, and we extend a hand to those in need. It is a mission that shows goodness can be very close to us – and it can change lives.

Between 2015 and 2025, more than **80 projects in Bulgaria have been dedicated to education**. Over 80!

The number itself is inspiring. Statistically, this means at least eight projects every year. The reality is probably higher – and if I have missed some, it is neither intentional nor selective. Words such as *education*, *training*, *scholarship*, *school*, *pupils*, *books and library* helped me uncover a vivid picture: a canvas painted by Bulgarian Rotary clubs, with budgets of hundreds of thousands, illustrating our deep and long-term commitment to the future of Bulgaria's children.

Education – the key to a brighter future

Deep down, we all feel the weight of Bulgaria's demographic challenges – the silence of empty schools in small towns, the sadness of parents whose children have left abroad. Rotary clubs believe that the strongest antidote to this loss is education. We transform every donation and every initiative into a message of hope that says:

"Stay here, grow here, because Bulgaria holds a future for you."

Our work is not just statistics – it is a collection of stories about transformed lives. When we donate laptops for online learning, we do not merely provide equipment – we open a window to knowledge for children who might otherwise be left behind. When we establish a scholarship, we do not simply offer financial support – Rotarians give wings to a talent ready to take flight. This is a struggle fought with love and dedication, whose ultimate aim is to keep young people in Bulgaria by helping them believe in themselves and in the potential of their homeland.

Impact on local communities: access and opportunity

The projects of Rotary clubs have a significant impact on local communities, reaching far beyond the classroom walls.

They often touch the entire social environment, making education more accessible and inclusive for every member of the community, regardless of their background or social status.

Access to knowledge for all

Initiatives such as donating computers to community centres in Berkovitsa and Petrich, to the home for children and families at risk in Malko Tarnovo, and providing water purification systems to schools in Varna, Kavarna and Dobrich – part of a multiplied project across other locations – improve not only the learning environment but also give access to basic resources for the wider community. The link between education and the wellbeing of the community is inseparable. Citizens who are better educated contribute to economic and social development, creating an environment where everyone can flourish.

Care for health in the classroom and library

Rotary Clubs Burgas-Primorie and Silistra donated air purifiers to schools and libraries, ensuring a healthier environment for children. Rotary Club Stara Zagora—Beroe built an outdoor fitness area for students, encouraging physical activity. Rotary Club Silistra also donated air purifiers to the Regional Library, including its children's section. These are only a small part of the projects listed on the District website – in reality, there are many more.

Support for children with special needs

Projects such as the creation of a sensory room in Stara Zagora and in other locations, as well as the donation of a modern interactive floor by Rotary Club Kazanlak to the Centre for Social Rehabilitation, demonstrate Rotary's commitment to inclusive education.

Equipment and learning tools

Rotary club Lyubimets supported a "Technology and Entrepreneurship" classroom with specialised equipment; Rotary Club Tutrakan provided a projector; Rotary Club Gabrovo helped the vocational training of students through the donation of sewing machines.

Innovation and digitalisation: education for the future

In a world of rapid technological change, Rotary clubs are ensuring students have access to modern learning methods and digital tools.

Interactive classrooms: Clubs such as Rotary Club Bansko–Razlog, Rotary Club Nova Zagora, Rotary Club Sliven, Rotary Club Sofia Capital, Rotary Club Sofia Triaditsa and Rotary Club Pomorie have donated interactive boards and displays, transforming classrooms into modern and engaging learning spaces.

Rotary Club Svishtov, with the support of The Rotary Foundation and Rotary Club Ruse, created a modern foreign language classroom in a digital environment. Rotary Club Ruse, again with Foundation support and in partnership with Rotary Club Silistra and Rotary Club Ruse–Danube, established a school classroom for civic education and the humanities.

Access to computers

Many clubs make life easier for pupils by donating computers. Among them are Rotary Clubs Dupnitsa, Panagyurishte and Plovdiv—Philippopolis. Rotary Clubs Nessebar and Sofia International have also contributed with cloud platforms and specialised learning materials. Rotary Club Smolyan, supported by The Rotary Foundation and in partnership with Rotary Clubs Zlatograd—Nedelino, Kardzhali, Interact Club Smolyan and other organisations, equipped a computer laboratory and built a wireless computer network across an entire school.

Innovative approaches

Rotary Club Shumen invested in teacher training in the Theory of Constraints method, while Rotary Club Nova Zagora created a workshop "From Children to Children", where pupils themselves design electronic products.

Culture and knowledge: projects for spirit and skills

Rotary clubs understand that education is not only about technology. They support the development of culture, literacy and practical skills.

Support for libraries

Rotary Clubs Gotse Delchev, Pazardzhik, Kyustendil, Harmanli, Karlovo, Samokov, Silistra and Balchik have enriched local library collections with new books, donated shelves and equipment, and carried out renovations. Rotary Club Sofia—Centre, through a District Grant, delivered the project "Renovation and Equipment of a Computer Hall and Library." Rotary Club Blagoevgrad—Centre, also through a District Grant and with the financial support of Rotary Clubs Dupnitsa, Bansko—Razlog, Gotse Delchev, Petrich and Sandanski, renewed the children's and teen sections of the Regional Library. Rotary Club Ruse created a modern multimedia learning centre.

Encouraging reading

Rotary Clubs Aytos and Nova Zagora welcomed first-grade pupils with educational materials. Rotary Club Harmanli donated children's books to mark International Children's Book Day. Rotary Club Sofia Triaditsa achieved something remarkable by donating books to an entire network of community centres across the country. Our partners in education continue to turn to them for collaboration.

Cultural heritage

Rotary Club Zlatograd–Nedelino organised a "School of Traditional Crafts", while Rotary Club Pleven–Centrum held events to showcase schools, stimulating interest in different fields of learning.

Praise for effort and awards

When Rotarians present a scholarship or a prize, what the student receives is not just an envelope – it is a promise. A promise that their hard work has been seen and valued.

Scholarships and financial support

Rotary Clubs Varna–Euxinograd, Veliko Tarnovo, Vidin, Kardzhali, Momchilgrad, Samokov, Popovo, Pleven–Centrum, Ruse, Sofia–Balkan, Haskovo, Nova Zagora, Bansko–Razlog and Troyan have all awarded scholarships and financial prizes to talented pupils and students. Rotary Club Zlatograd–Nedelino has even established a scholarship fund for doctors and medical professionals.

Support for dual education and innovation

Rotary Club Kardzhali supports dual education; Rotary Club Pazardzhik enabled a group of students to travel to Brussels to present their project; Rotary Club Harmanli backed a robotics team competing in an international tournament.

Mathematics and knowledge

Rotary Clubs Chirpan and Pleven–Centrum organise mathematics competitions. In Burgas, in October last year, a contest brought together 403 children. A second round is now being prepared, with invitations to children from across the country and neighbouring districts. Rotary Club Targovishte provides learning aids for first-grade pupils, while Rotary Club Kazanlak supplies school materials.

Every five years, Rotary Club Burgas publishes a book featuring the works of talented children – poems, essays and paintings. Rotary Club Burgas–Pyrgos traditionally awards the winners of a fine arts competition.

International mission and community service

Rotary clubs in Bulgaria extend their mission beyond the country's borders, partnering with international clubs and helping communities abroad. Rotary Club Gorna Banya, together with Rotary Club Sofia International, donated books to a Bulgarian school in Greece.

Rotary Clubs Kardzhali and Edirne support a Sunday school in Turkey. Rotary Club Plovdiv International works with international organisations to support the integration of refugee children into the education system.

All these actions are proof that Rotary clubs in Bulgaria are not simply investing in education. They are investing in people, in the future, and in the hope that Bulgaria can be a better place to live. They remind us that with a little more care and faith, we can change the world around us for the better.

In this field, the Basic Education and Literacy Rotary Action Group (BELRAG) also plays a key role. It was created in 2011 by Rotarians and other dedicated individuals from around the world who share a special interest in advancing the mission and goals of Rotary International related to reducing illiteracy; improving the teaching and learning of literacy globally; and helping to provide educational materials and equipment at different levels. Like all Rotary Action Groups, BELRAG is an autonomous association of Rotarians with shared interests, together with partners of Rotarians and Rotaractors, working alongside clubs and districts on projects focused on basic education and literacy.

As with other Rotary Action Groups, BELRAG has implemented many impressive projects across the globe. One of the most striking examples that illustrates the scope of its work is the Guatemala Literacy Project (GLP).

This is one of Rotary's largest and most successful multi-club, multi-district projects. It began in 1997, launched by two brothers who volunteered as teachers in Guatemala. Their mission was to fight illiteracy in a country where many speak indigenous languages, while school materials were available only in Spanish.

The project began as a small initiative to donate textbooks, but it quickly grew into a large-scale programme that includes:

- More than 48 Global Grants funded by The Rotary Foundation, with a total value exceeding US\$6.5 million.
- The participation of 817 Rotary clubs from 99 districts worldwide (as of 6 September 2025).
- Partnerships with NGOs and other local institutions.

This project is not limited to donating books. It is a comprehensive programme that includes:

- Providing textbooks and learning materials in indigenous languages.
- Building computer labs and offering training in digital literacy.

- A scholarship programme for young people.
- Teacher training, enabling them to teach more effectively and to work with a variety of learning materials.

One of the greatest successes of the project is its sustainability. Schools that receive textbooks establish a revolving fund from the rental income of the books, which allows them to replace the materials over time without requiring further external assistance from Rotary.

This project is an excellent example of how a small idea, when supported by the strength of Rotary, can grow into a global movement that transforms the lives of thousands by giving them access to quality education.

Just a few days ago, from 22 to 27 September, the Rhodopes became a stage of inspiration, cultural exchange and youthful energy. The Fifth Balkan Architectural Workshop – an initiative of Rotary Club Kardzhali, in partnership with Momchilgrad Municipality and Rotary Club Momchilgrad – was held in Kardzhali and Momchilgrad. It united architecture students and their mentors from Bulgaria, Greece, North Macedonia and Turkey.

The beginning – an unforgettable encounter with history







Our action aims to improve the local community and promote healthy living habits. The funds raised are invested in the development and donation of bicycle bikes schools. This year, 260 cyclists participated, including 50 children. The program included:

- Revijal driving city streets, 10 km long, with start in the "Barutan" park. Security provided orders, police and professional security.


